Boosting GDP and harnessing opportunity


Adding up to £69bn to UK economy, investing in YP benefits long-term productivity and competitiveness. YP bring new ideas, different perspectives, and skills.

Fully-funded training, up to level 3, to help young people develop the skills needed for work




Access to mental and physical health support, including talking therapies.
