

Responsible Procurement Diagnostic Tool Value Codes

- Developed for EELGA, launched November 2022
- Run on the same platform as the LGA National Procurement Strategy
- Using 30 value codes and defined outcomes as to what good looks like using a maturity scale
- Designed for Councils to complete to help organise, prioritise and ensure their sustainability commitments are realised

Project objectives

- Develop a common view and language for the scope of responsible procurement across the East of England
- Gain a regional perspective of where we are now in relation to the UN sustainability goals
- Discover how well we are positioned to embrace responsible procurement
- Identify examples of good practice and innovation in the region
- Understand and benefit from differences between upper tier and lower tier authorities
- ➤ Engage councils in defining what good looks like for the region (at Tier level)
- Produce an evidence-based Action Plan with commitment from the region to work collaboratively to achieve shared goals including identifying opportunities for joint working, commissioning of specialist resources and procurement opportunities

Respondents were asked to score 30 'value codes' (VCs) against a maturity scale



- Each council invited a number of respondents, all of whom have a stake in responsible procurement
- > Respondents were given nearly 3 weeks to submit their response



Participation

- We expected Councils to identify 10-15 individuals Officers and members who are key to influencing the Council's ability to deliver responsible procurement.
 - 248* People Invited, an average of 20 per Council
- ➤ We wanted to achieve an overall participation rate of 50%
- * This excludes people who were later removed as they were:
 - Too new to post
 - Unable to assess most of the value codes
 - Too junior
 - Long term sick/left



Participating Councils

- 13 Councils participated11 Districts*, 2Unitaries
- 10 Councils achieved50% response
- All Councils achieved >30%
- Overall, 151 people (61%) completed the Diagnostic
