

In the past year, we used our legal, analytical, and lobbying skills to coordinate work on behalf of our members. Our support extends to addressing current issues occurring for local authorities, such as asylum, building regulations, and the Standards Committee Model Code, where we provide guidance and legal advice to our members.



We identify and coordinate collective actions on behalf of the sector, for example, the truck cartel and the Mastercard/Visa claim and Local Land Charges, generating significant funds. Insights gathered from member surveys and case studies have been instrumental in highlighting the unprecedented cost and demand pressures facing councils in the lead-up to the Autumn Statement 2023 and the Spring Budget 2024.

Through our policy development, engagement and influencing, we helped secure positive changes for local government. Our events, training, guidance and support for council leaders, councillors and officers have helped you get to grips with a wide range of issues – from transformation to cyber security.

Thank you to our members, whose support has been central to these successes over the past year. We hope that this membership pack demonstrates the value of councils working together through the LGA as your national voice.

2023/24 LGA highlights

Over the past year, we took every opportunity to support, promote, and improve local government. Here is a selection of highlights.

2023

AUGUST

LGA-commissioned research showed that schools within their council continued to outshine academies, providing evidence for why councils should be given powers to open **new maintained schools**.

SEPTEMBER

The Government unveiled a **£1.1 billion Long-term Plan for Towns** – allocating funds based on need, not competitive bidding – for 55 towns to invest in local priorities; and we hit the airwaves to raise **concerns about RAAC concrete in schools**.

OCTOBER

Through our **Step Ahead campaign** during National Care Leavers' Week, we highlighted support for those leaving care, and refreshed the support we provide to councils; and Local L Government Levelling Up Locally inquiry report



we concluded our **party conference season** with the LGA holding events at the Liberal Democrat, Conservative, Labour and Green conferences.

NOVEMBER

We briefed parliamentarians and took to the media ahead of the **Autumn Statement** to highlight the financial pressures facing councils and, following our longstanding lobbying, the Government confirmed the restoration of the **Local Housing Allowance rates** to the 30th percentile of market rents.







DECEMBER

Following November's King's Speech, we set out a **roadmap for influencing legislation** and highlighted our **Debate Not Hate** campaign during a Lords debate on democracy and standards in public life. We achieved widespread media coverage with our **finance survey results**, which revealed that almost one in five council leaders

and chief executives in England think it is very or fairly likely that their chief finance officer will need to issue a Section 114 in 2024. By the end of the year, we secured more than **£2 billion for Homes for Ukraine** and associated refugee-related projects.

2024

JANUARY

The Government announced **£600 million** of funding for the sector in 2024/25, including **£500 million** for social care; plans to **ban single-use vapes** were announced following our longstanding calls. We also launched our local government recruitment

campaign pilot in the NorthEast, which rolls out nationwide this year.

FEBRUARY

Widely reported new LGA analysis showed that **twothirds of councils warned there will be a cutback in 2024 to local services**.

such as waste collection and road repairs. We called on political parties to introduce the Extended Producer Responsibility scheme and proposed new **reforms to the Right to Buy scheme**.







APRIL

We launched our highly valued 2024/25 Sector Support programme, and we joined forces with the **Electoral Commission and** the Jo Cox Foundation to protect candidates from abuse during local elections. We issued a strong, crossparty statement about the role of the Office for Local Government (Oflog) after its data was used by the media to create misleading and inaccurate rankings of councils.



MAY

Ten years after the introduction of the Care Act, our report laid bare the urgent action needed in adult social care, and we called for immediate investment. To support local leaders and councils, we launched our Leaders Plus programme and a new improvement and assurance framework. Following strong engagement with the LGA, the National Employers announced a full and final pay offer for council employees.

MARCH

Over 170 council leaders joined us to call on the Chancellor to **extend the Housing Support Fund** at the Spring Budget. We

welcomed the announced six-month extension but lamented the absence of measures to adequately fund local services. We also launched a strengthened **Corporate Peer Challenge** and welcomed **Joanna Killian** as the LGA's new Chief Executive.







JUNE

Following the announcement of the General Election, we published our **Local Government White Paper**. It included new analysis that councils in England face a **funding gap of £6.2 billion** over the next two years, and we called on all parties to commit to a significant and sustained increase

in council funding in the next Spending Review. We announced **Impact: The Local Government Graduate Programme** as the new name and rebrand of our successful graduate scheme.

JULY

We **welcomed a new** Government with many new MPs entering their roles from the local government family, including former LGA Chair Councillor Shaun Davies. Consequently, we also **welcomed the new** LGA Chair, Councillor Louise Gittins, who led her first Councillors' Forum with Angela Rayner – the new Deputy Prime Minister

and Secretary of State for the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government - and Minister of State Jim McMahon. The **UK COVID-19 Inquiry report** on Module 1: Resilience and Preparedness was published, where the LGA was a core participant. Finally, we published a new report with County Councils Network and Isos Partnership showing that education outcomes for SEND pupils have failed to improve over the last decade despite costs trebling.


