- Post 1945, Chief Planners Officers were key players in local authorities
- Impact of 1980s deregulation
- Planning side lined and diminished corporate presence





Key findings of research

In the UK and Ireland (excluding NI):

Only 23% of local authorities surveyed had a head of planning service that reported directly to the Chief Executive

1 in 10 local authorities did not have an individual post holder responsible for planning

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Figure 2: The management structure of local government

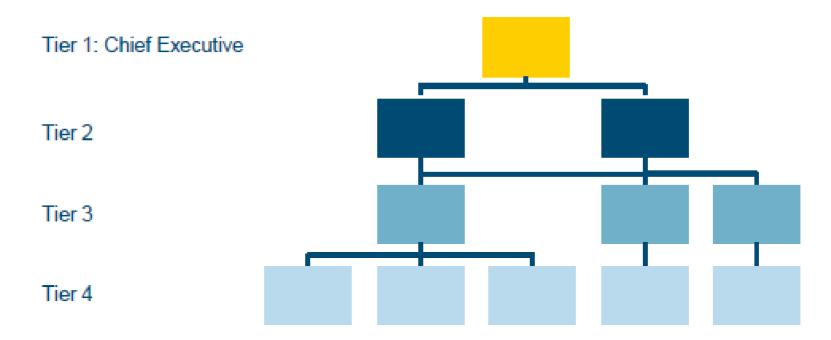
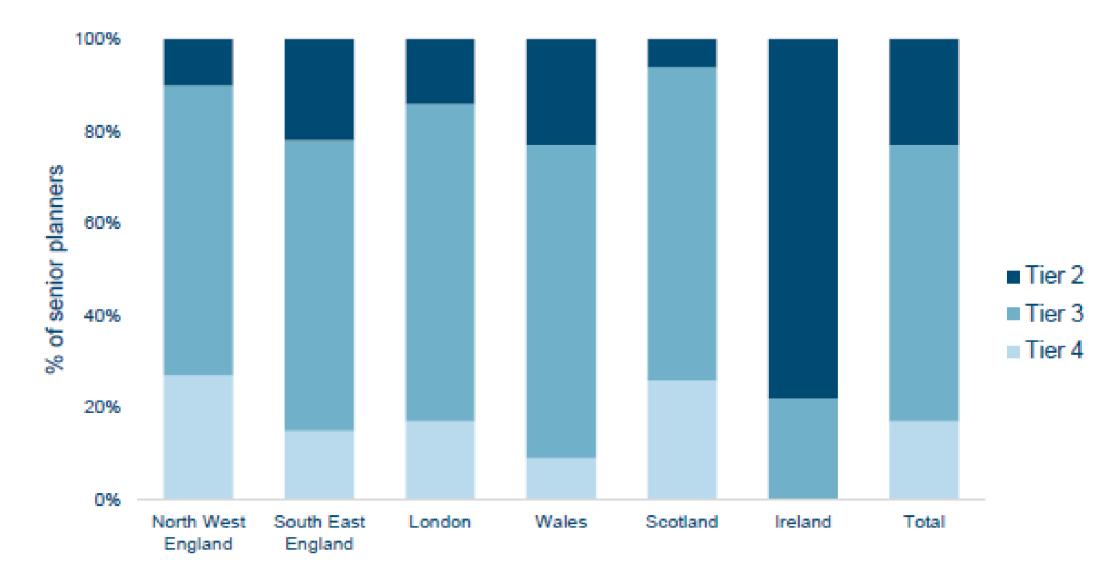




Figure 1: Percentage of the most senior planners within the different tiers of local government, across the English Regions and UK Nations









The training that a planner has is fundamentally about making connections, networking, seeing the big picture, so they are great skills to add into corporate discussions.

Main findings

- Multiple benefits of consulting planners from the outset of the decision making process around development.
- "...understanding that we can contribute enormously to the work that you do if you engage with us much earlier."
 - (Chief Planning Officer, England)



Main findings

- Having a Chief Planning Officer at the top table can provide:
 - ✓ Long-term vision
 - ✓ Engagement with communities
 - √ certainty for development



Main findings

- Planning is a powerful lever to deliver almost all the key areas within an authority's corporate strategy.
- Important interface with elected members and the public
- Horizon scanning "What is this place going to look like?"



The Plymouth Plan

- Joined-up, investment programme and all in one corporate strategy
- Planning department led the process
- Worked to understand councillor's ambitions
- Achieved consensus
- Shows benefits of putting planners at the top table



Recommendations

- Legislate to require Chief Planning Officers
- Follow Scotland's lead
- Engage planners early
- Mid-career mentoring and management training
