

East Midlands – regional profile

Introduction

The East Midlands has a diverse landscape, economy and population. There are large rural areas as well as large conurbations and other relatively industrialised areas. The region is bordered by Yorkshire and The Humber, the North West, the West Midlands, the South East and East of England regions and by the North Sea coastline to the east. In area it is 15,600 square km making it the fourth largest English region, smaller than the South West, East of England and the South East. The region covers 12 per cent of the total area of England and 6 per cent of the UK. It contains five counties; Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Lincolnshire, Northamptonshire and Nottinghamshire, and four unitary authorities: Derby, Leicester, Rutland and Nottingham.

The region has an above-average proportion of residents (aged 16 to 64 and working) employed in routine occupations requiring a low level of skills or qualifications, 13 per cent in 2011 compared with 11 per cent in the UK. By contrast, occupations which require the highest skills or qualifications were under-represented, at 39 per cent of all employed residents compared with 43 per cent in the UK.

The unemployment rate for the region was 8.2 per cent in Q4 2011, slightly lower than the UK rate of 8.4 per cent. In the year ending September 2011 Mansfield local authority had the highest unemployment rate in the region at 10.9 per cent. The lowest was 4.0 per cent in Derbyshire

East Midlands has below average levels of qualifications and one of the lowest proportions of 16-year-olds remaining in education. The proportion of 16-year-olds in post-compulsory education and government-supported training in 2009/10 was 88 per cent, the joint lowest (with Yorkshire and The Humber) of all English regions.

In general, the East Midlands had police recorded crime rates similar to the English average. For example, 14 offences of violence against the person per 1,000 population in 2010/11 were recorded for the East Midlands and 15 for England. The regional average masks considerable sub-regional variation. For example, the rates of violence against the person in the counties and unitary authorities ranged from 6.4 per 1,000 population in Rutland to 25.8 per 1,000 population in Leicester.
